

Eligible businesses can take advantage of the state's Educational Improvement Tax Credit program (EITC) and help preschoolers at the same time, for a win/win opportunity. Such tax credits can be contributed to a Pre-Kindergarten Scholarship Organization like **Pocono Services for Families and Children**, which serves children at centers throughout Monroe County.

The current application process began on July 1, but businesses can still apply by going to [www.newPA.com/eitc](http://www.newPA.com/eitc).

PSFC is approved as a Pre-Kindergarten Scholarship Organization by the Pennsylvania Department of Community and Economic Development (DCED). This designation allows PSFC to provide income-eligible families with direct tuition assistance to enroll their child in a high quality pre-kindergarten program.

Businesses may receive tax credits up to \$200,000 a year to support this important work in our community. Credits may be applied against the tax liability of the company for the tax year in which the donation was contributed. Eligibility is based on companies that conduct business in Pennsylvania and pay at least one of these taxes: corporate net income tax, capital stock franchise tax, bank and trust company shares tax, title insurance companies shares tax, insurance premiums tax, mutual thrift institution tax, and insurance company law of 1921. After they apply for the EITC (indicating the tax credit contribution/amount), businesses will receive written notification as to whether they have been approved. Then they just follow these easy steps:

- 1.) Send their contribution to PSFC within 60 days.
- 2.) Within 7 days, PSFC will send the business a letter acknowledging the contribution.
- 3.) The business will forward a copy of this acknowledgment to the Department of Community and Economic Development within 90 days of original notification.
- 4.) The business will file its tax return as usual and claim a tax credit for its contribution.

A business may also claim a charitable deduction on this same contribution.

**Good Shepherd Rehabilitation Network** ([www.GoodShepherdRehab.org](http://www.GoodShepherdRehab.org)), an Allentown, Pennsylvania-based innovator in the rehabilitation of physical and cognitive disabilities, will soon be the first health-care organization in North America to receive new Variable Assist software for the Ekso bionic exoskeleton.

The Ekso is a wearable, bionic suit, created and produced by Ekso Bionics ([www.eksobionics.com](http://www.eksobionics.com)), which enables individuals with lower extremity paralysis or weakness to stand and walk. Battery powered motors drive the legs and replace neuro-muscular function. The addition of Variable Assist now provides the ability for Good Shepherd’s clinicians to augment their patients’ strength by tuning the amount of power contributed to help walking efforts for either leg. Variable Assist adds to the Ekso’s utility for patients with hemiparesis due to stroke, incomplete spinal cord injury or other neurological injuries or conditions.

Since 2012, Good Shepherd has used the Ekso with spinal cord injury patients, in its outpatient Neurorehabilitation Program. The new Variable Assist software will arrive at Good Shepherd on July 30, 2013, and will be an upgrade to Good Shepherd’s current Ekso rehabilitation technology. In late August, Good Shepherd will receive delivery of a second Ekso bionic exoskeleton with Variable Assist for inpatient use at Good Shepherd Rehabilitation Hospital.

Many stroke patients experience hemiparesis, or partial paralysis, in a limb or limbs. The new Variable Assist software will allow Good Shepherd’s stroke patients to recover more quickly and enhance their walking capabilities. Good Shepherd’s therapists now have the option to assign a specific amount of power contribution (based on therapeutic goals) to augment patients’ efforts, or to allow the Ekso to dynamically adjust to their needs in real time. For example, the clinician may assign a higher power contribution to produce a more naturalized gait, or less power contribution to challenge the patient’s walking efforts. This encour-

ages patients to actively contribute to their recovery process and helps the therapist challenge patients with progressive rehabilitation.

“Being the first on the continent to have Ekso with Variable Assist shows Good Shepherd’s commitment to providing leading-edge rehabilitation care to our patients,” says Frank Hyland, vice president, Rehabilitation, Good Shepherd Rehabilitation Network. “Our therapists in our Neurorehabilitation Department have seen great success with the Ekso for spinal cord patients, and now we are certain that this technology will help our stroke patients regain function and return to their lives.”

Good Shepherd was the third rehabilitation organization in the United States to receive the Ekso in spring of 2012. Since that time, more than 20 spinal cord injury patients have walked using the Ekso and have included the bionic exoskeleton in their therapy regimen. The Ekso has provided amazing progress for some of Good Shepherd’s spinal cord injury patients, who are now able to walk using their own power and leg braces and crutches.

The **United Way of Monroe County** has announced that a total of \$781,954 is being provided to help those in need as a result of the 2012 Campaign revenue and non-campaign designated revenue. This total includes: \$479,158 in grants allocated to 29 local programs serving four targeted need areas; \$70,451 in gifts designated to other United Ways and other non-profits; \$18,000 for Pocono Info, the information and referral service for Monroe County; \$79,370 to American Red Cross of the Poconos for disaster relief supplies, food, shelter and other disaster materials from designated Hurricane Sandy Relief Funds; \$3,000 Educational Improvement Tax Credit Program donation designated to provide scholarships for approved Pre-K programs; and \$131,975 for United Way of Monroe County direct community services.

Through the efforts of its 2012 campaign chair, Trip Ruvane and everyone who gave of their time, talent and treasure, the United Way of Monroe County was successful in making a modest increase in funds raised in 2012. This, along with the pro-activeness in reducing expenses by the United Way of Monroe County board and staff, additional dollars were able to be allocated this year to partner agencies along with an increase in the total of community service funds.

Grants decisions and recommendations are the result of an extensive review period, which started in early March of this year and continued into May. “Many thanks to the 39 volunteers who gave of their time and talent to serve on the fund distribution panels,” says the United Way of Monroe County’s 2013 board president, Lynn Lansdowne. “These volunteers reviewed our partner agencies’ applications, made site visits to see our agencies’ programs in action and reviewed their outcomes, or how their clients’ lives have changed as a result of the programs’ services,” said Pam Watkins, fund distribution steering committee

chair. Each panel discussed and made decisions regarding the funding for their need areas. The United Way of Monroe County board of directors then reviewed these decisions and made final approval of the grants.

Even with this increase, all agency requests could not be fully funded. Meeting basic needs continues to be a priority in our community with more demand for housing, food, and utilities assistance. For example, 35% of the grants were awarded to programs in this need area. Helping children succeed programs received 33%, reflecting the growing need for funding of these programs due to government and grant cut backs. The *Tom Breslauer "Survivors' Garden"* located on the campus of **Pocono Medical Center** adjacent to the main lobby. It was created to honor and remember the life of Tom Breslauer, whose tireless commitment to the community and encouraging belief in peace and forgiveness made

a positive impact on many lives. "It is our hope that this garden will be a refuge for those in need of a healing environment, similar to the one Tom provided for so many," said Camille Breslauer.

The late Tom Breslauer of Stroudsburg was a Holocaust survivor who educated hundreds of students and adults throughout the country and was also very active in the community. Mr. Breslauer passed away in May 2009 at

the age of 92 but many people will remember Tom by one of his famous quotes, a simple but inspiring message that reflected his remarkable character, "You must not hate, no matter race, color or religion. You don't have to love everybody, but you must respect human life...and don't smoke!" Mr. Breslauer was born in Hamburg, Germany, and immigrated to the United States in 1940 after a lengthy internment in the Dachau Concentration Camp. His father was killed in the Battle of the Somme while fighting in the Germany army in World War I and his mother was killed in Riga Concentration Camp in December 1941. He was forced to leave school when Adolph Hitler came to power in 1933 and then went to work in a shoe factory in Offenbach, Germany.

On November 9, 1938, he was actually arrested on Kristallnacht, the "Night of Broken Glass," when thousands of Jews were arrested and sent to the Dachau prison camp, where he endured five months of hunger and brutal work. Tom was drafted in 1942 and served from 1942 until 1946 as a member of the United States 79<sup>th</sup> Infantry Division, where he fought in Europe during World War II. In 1946, he was discharged from the Army with the rank of tech sergeant.

Tom moved to Stroudsburg in 1952 to start and manage the Pocono Shoe Factory and in 1960, he started his own business, Lisa Bee Manufacturing Co., producing women's blouses. That business was sold in 1982. Tom's involvement in the community including serving as a past president of Temple Israel; past president of the American Cancer Society; president and treasurer of B'nai B'rith Lodge; treasurer of SCORE; a Paul Harris Fellow of Rotary Club of the Stroudsburg; an advisory board member of Northampton Community College, and a board member of Pocono Healthy Communities Alliance. When he retired, he gave hundreds of talks to schools and organizations about his life experiences. Tom always stressed the importance of young people taking responsibility to make this a better world, where people will be able to live in peace and harmony.
