August's DAISY Award recipient goes to Wendy Savercool, RN from the Infusion Area of the Cancer Center. Wendy was nominated by a patient who received care from Wendy, "One of the attributes of the healing process is the trust in the delivery of the caregiver. Wendy has not only been a professional health care provider, she has become a trusted friend. I rely on her exceptional judgement and expert medical care. She creates an environment for healing. I know that my medical care would not be as good without her. I highly honor Wendy for her commitment to nursing and patient care."

The not-for-profit DAISY Foundation is based in Glen Ellen, CA, and was established by family members in memory of J. Patrick Barnes. Patrick died at the age of 33 in late 1999 from complications of Idiopathic Thrombocytopenic Purpura (ITP), a little known but not uncommon auto-immune disease. The care Patrick and his family received from nurses while he was ill inspired this unique means of thanking nurses for making a profound difference in the lives of their patients and patient families.

"It's important that our nurses and our community know how much we value the work that our nurses do every day

in exceeding the standards for patient care," said Elizabeth Wise, RN, MSN, MBA, DrNP(c), NEA-BC, CENP, Chief Operating Officer and Chief Nursing Officer at Pocono Medical Center. "The DAISY Award provides a way for us to express that."

Each month, a nurse will be selected by Pocono Medical Center's nursing administration to receive The DAISY Award. At a presentation given in front of the nurse's colleagues, physicians, patients, and visitors, the honoree will receive a certificate commending her or him for being an "Extraordinary Nurse." The certificate reads: "In deep appreciation of all you do, who you are, and the incredibly meaningful difference you make in the lives of so many people." The honoree will also be given a beautiful and meaningful sculpture called A Healer's Touch, hand-carved by artists of the Shona Tribe in Africa.

St. Luke's Eliminates Brain Tumors with Breakthrough Laser Treatment

St. Luke's University Health Network is the first in the region to offer a new laser procedure that uses minimally invasive MRI-guided laser technology to target and destroy cancerous brain tumors.

Visualase®, an MRI-guided laser ablation system by Medtronic, enables neurosurgeons to deliver laser energy through a hole with a diameter approximately the size of a coffee stirrer. The precision of the technology, also known as laser interstitial thermal therapy (LITT), allows the laser to destroy the tumor while minimizing harm to surrounding tissue.

"This is an exciting breakthrough in the treatment of brain cancer," says Hugh Moulding, MD, PhD, Chief of St. Luke's Department of Neurosurgery and Clinical Director of the St. Luke's Brain and Spine Tumor Center. "We are now able to treat tumors previously considered inoperable because the accuracy of laser technology allows us to reach lesions deep into the brain and even near sensitive areas." Dr. Moulding is the only physician in the Lehigh Valley and surrounding areas performing the procedure.

"MRI-guided laser ablation is often the best hope for patients due to the lesion's location or because the patient has already exhausted other treatment options," he says. "For example, radiosurgery, a type of radiation therapy, is an effective treatment of brain lesions, however, using radiosurgery to treat a recurring tumor greatly increases the risk of complications from radiation."

Dr. Moulding recently recommended the procedure to Angela Thomas, a 48-year-old wife and mother of two teenagers. Angela was diagnosed with melanoma, and then brain cancer, about two years ago. Consequently, she has received various types of cancer treatments. When a tumor previously treated with radiosurgery began to regrow, Dr. Moulding scheduled the laser ablation procedure. She received the treatment on May 26 at St. Luke's University Hospital in Bethlehem.

"I didn't know exactly what to expect, but the treatment went very well," says Angela, who lives in Forksville, Sullivan County, about three hours north of Easton. "It was much simpler than I expected."

To prepare a patient for the treatment, Dr. Moulding drills a small hole in the skull. Then, the laser applicator and cooling catheter are precisely placed into the tumor. The patient is then taken to the MRI suite to confirm placement of the laser. As a safeguard, Dr. Moulding delivers a low power test pulse. During the treatment, the laser power is increased and while the laser is activated, special MRI images are converted to thermal maps and damage zone estimates. These provide Dr. Moulding with precise feedback in real time. He uses these to manage the laser's delivery of light energy to the target area as the tumor is heated and destroyed.

Immediately after therapy, Dr. Moulding reviews additional MRI images to verify that the treated area matched the patient's surgical goal.

"Due to the minimally invasive nature of the procedure, patients are discharged within a day of their procedure – much sooner than patients who have had traditional, open surgery," Dr. Moulding says. "Also, laser ablation patients report experiencing fewer side effects than those receiving open surgery."

In fact, Angela had no side effects. "I didn't even have a headache," she says. "My entire family was very anxious before the procedure so the first thing I did after surgery was to call my kids. I face-timed them so they could see that I was fine."

Also, because the entry level is so small, the procedure leaves little or no noticeable scarring or loss of hair. "The spot healed within two weeks," Angela says. "I took it easy for three weeks and then I was back to normal."

Now, Angela, who loves camping, is planning a family trip to upstate New York this summer.

"For two summers now, I have had health issues," she says. "This is the first time in three years that our family gets to enjoy camping together. I can't wait."

Though Dr. Piotrowski is coming to St. Luke's from Temple University Hospital, he is not new to the Lehigh Valley having earned his undergraduate degree at Muhlenberg College.

"I have advanced training in minimally invasive techniques, including robotic and laparoscopic approaches, and I utilize these whenever they provide the best and safest treatment for my patients. I manage stone disease, both with medical and surgical options, and assist men and women with voiding dysfunction of various types."

Dr. Piotrowski is married and has two children. He and his family enjoy the outdoors, and he is currently learning to fly fish.

"With this money, we have been able to send nurses to National Neonatal Conferences, provide self-learning CEs for the NICU staff and help purchase the Neonatal Orientation and Education Program which we use for all new

NICU staff. It has been an invaluable resource for us," Raab said.

St. Luke's University Health Network provides newborn intensive care in a Level III NICU of the highest level in the region at St. Luke's University Hospital – Bethlehem, and at its Allentown Campus which has a Level II unit.

Since having a baby hospitalized in a NICU can be an overwhelming experience for parents, the program addresses their needs as well as those of siblings, grandparents and the extended family throughout the hospitalization, during the transition home and in the unfortunate and rare event of a newborn death.

Man Up! Pocono Medical Center Celebrates National Prostate Health Month with Region's Only Free Prostate Screenings

In honor of National Prostate Health Month, on September 21 Pocono Medical Center's Dale and Frances Hughes Cancer Center held its annual, free prostate cancer screening event providing early detection for men ages 50-75.

"When it comes to cancer, preventative measures are at the foundation of the comprehensive care we provide at The Dale and Frances Hughes Cancer Center," said Stacy Goetz, Executive Director, Oncology Service Line of The Dale and Frances Hughes Cancer Center. "We recognize the importance of screening, early detection, and education. We are grateful for our physicians who are determined to impact and improve the lives of the patients and their families."

At Wednesday's event, The Dale and Frances Hughes Cancer Center registered over 50 men to receive the free prostate screening. The screenings were performed by Dr. Sean Quinlan-Davidson, Radiation Oncologist of The Dale and Frances Hughes Cancer Center, which consisted of a physical exam and PSA blood test. "Performing these screenings allows us to teach our patients to pay more attention to their body and make more informed decisions about their health," said Dr. Quinlan-Davidson.

Ron Shick, 76, of Stroudsburg registered for the event to receive what he refers to as "preventative maintenance." Shick was diagnosed with cancer in October of 2015 and became a patient of The Dale and Frances Hughes Cancer Center under the care of Dr. Quinlan-Davidson. "Dr. Quinlan-Davidson sincerely cared for me during my procedure," said Shick. "He told me I was his number one concern, which instilled all of my faith and trust in the physicians and staff."

Shick recently learned that he is now cancer free, and like many men, have become proactive when it comes to taking initiative of their health. "I truly believe that The Dale and Frances Hughes Cancer Center is an absolute asset to the community to have this level of care in our backyard," said Shick.

Following the completion of the screenings, each participant received a voucher for one free ShawneeCraft draft beer at ShawneeCraft Tap Room courtesy of ShawneeCraft Brewing. “More important, this initiative is a unique way to engage the community while getting them acquainted with becoming proactive by promoting cancer awareness,” said Dr. Quinlan-Davidson.

PSFC Planning for Next 50 Years with Opening of The Mountain Center

Pocono Services for Families and Children is adding new educational programs, staff and community services, with the purchase of the former Coolbaugh Elementary Center in Tobyhanna. The new facility, which officially opened in early September, is now known as The Mountain Center.

PSFC recently acquired the school, which had been vacant since 2012, for \$3.1 million. The closing on the approximately 50-acre property and 92,000 square foot building took place at the end of June. The school was purchased from the Pocono Mountain School District.

"We have exciting plans and great ideas for this center, and some of these are already in place," said Tim Lee, executive director of PSFC, whose programs include Monroe County Head Start. "It is fitting that we bought the facility during our 50th anniversary year for Head Start, as we now have a clear vision of our work for the next 50 years."

Starting in October, PSFC will be serving infants and toddlers, in addition to the 319 preschoolers it now serves throughout the county in Head Start, Pre-K Counts and self-pay classrooms. The agency has experienced tremendous growth during the last year and more space was needed to accommodate this growth. A before and after school program for kindergartners through third graders will be offered at the Tobyhanna location—also a new initiative for PSFC.

The Mountain Center will be a central location for several community and educational services. Besides serving children age birth through third grade, the facility will house several nonprofit agencies and training opportunities. These include Habitat for Humanity, WIC, Area Agency on Aging, Pocono Alliance, Women's Resources, and Youth Employment Services, with others to follow.

The Feeding Families Ministry, a food pantry, has already moved into the building and opened its doors on Sept. 8. Eight preschool classes for three to five-year-olds started the same day. Also, on Sept. 8, about 70 employees of Sanofi Pasteur volunteered at The Mountain Center as part of United Way's Day of Caring. Projects included an outdoor classroom, landscaping, painting and assistance with classroom materials.

"We will be able to meet the various needs of residents, from the youngest to seniors," Lee said.

"The location will provide one-stop shopping for human services."

Representatives from Monroe County agencies and the local media have toured The Mountain Center and learned about PSFC's vision. Besides classrooms and office space, the two-story building has a full-size gymnasium, cafeteria with stage, and library that has been converted to a teacher's planning/training room.

Lee noted that there is a tremendous need for services and programs in the Tobyhanna area, and this new facility will serve that void. Future plans include a garden, nature paths and a fitness trail. Community events will also be in the works.

"The feedback from the public has been overwhelmingly positive," Lee said. "Local residents and groups are excited as we are."

Besides the Mountain Center, PSFC has an administrative/early education center in East Stroudsburg Borough, preschool classrooms in the East Stroudsburg Area School District, and a home-based program option for some Head Start parents. New infant/toddler classrooms will also be opening at PSFC's East Stroudsburg Center. Additional staff are being hired to meet all these needs.

PSFC is accredited by the National Association for the Education of Young Children and its sites have all earned a Keystone Star 4 rating, the highest level in Pennsylvania. The agency provides comprehensive services for young children and their families to promote success in school and life.
