# **BUDGET ADOPTED; TAX INCREASES ON BUSINESS STOPPED**

Pennsylvania's 2007-08 fiscal year's General Fund budget holds the line on business tax increases proposed by the Rendell administration - some seven new and/or expanded taxes on business to the tune of \$1.2 billion.

With the help of members and pro-business legislators, the PA Chamber was able to stop these ill-conceived new taxes:

- a new electricity tax at an estimated budget cost of \$75 million;
- a 1 percent increase in the sales tax at \$1.42 billion:
- a health-care payroll tax at \$120.8 million;
- a loosely-defined oil company gross profits tax at \$760 million; and
- a new increase to landfill tipping fees estimated at \$41.6 million

Two additional taxes that were proposed but not enacted included a 10 cent per pack increase to the cigarette tax at an estimated cost of \$61 million and a smokeless tobacco/cigar tax at \$30 million.

The budget includes a one-mill reduction in the Capital Stock and Franchise tax, continuing the scheduled phase-out without interruption, while the efforts of anti-business lawmakers to implement mandatory unitary combined reporting were defeated.

The budget also includes \$75 million for a film industry tax credit. With money available in this year's budget thanks to a \$650 million revenue surplus, the PA Chamber and other business groups had instead hoped for a legislative fix for a Revenue Department policy change that now subjects downloadable computer software to the state sales tax. The policy change was a result of a court ruling in the Graham Packaging case; business took a \$55 million hit in last year's budget as a result. The PA Chamber has been working on a legislative solution, but has been repeatedly told there was no money in the budget to address the issue.

A solution to Graham Packaging or other business tax reforms single sales factor, elimination of the cap on net operating losses and a reduced Corporate Net Income tax would have been a wiser use of state dollars and would have a much broader benefit than the film industry tax credit.

The budget provides funding from slots revenues for a new Pittsburgh Penguins arena and the Philadelphia Convention Center.

Varying figures have been cited in reference to the new budget's increase in spending over the prior fiscal year, with 3.3 percent (which doesn't include the pending transportation funding bill) at the low range; and 4.5 percent if the transportation funding bill is included. Others have put the spending increase at more than 5 percent. The increase is more than some lawmakers had wanted, but nonetheless represent a smaller increase in the growth of government spending than previous state budgets.

### **Transportation Funding Plan Signed into Law**

This week, Governor Ed Rendell signed into law a transportation/mass transit funding bill that is expected to provide nearly \$946 million a year over the next decade to fund road and bridge repairs, and the state's mass transit systems.

The Proposal:

- Implements the tolling of I-80, which will be managed by the Turnpike Commission. The toll will be approximately 8 cents per mile, with about 10 toll booths placed across the state.
   Construction to provide for tolling capacity is expected to be completed within 18-36 months.
- Authorizes the Turnpike Commission to issue a \$5 billion bond, to be paid for by future tolling increases.
- Allows for performance criteria, such as rider capacity, in determining funding for mass transit agencies.
- Adopts a code of conduct for the Pennsylvania Turnpike Commission that is similar to that which exists for the Pennsylvania Gaming Control Board.
- Moves up the date for increasing fares on the Pennsylvania Turnpike to 2009. Fares were originally slated to be increased by 25 percent in 2010. Fares will continue to increase at a rate of 3 percent annually after 2009.
- Allows for a greater local share for mass transit systems, increasing it from 13 percent to 15 percent. With the exception of Allegheny County, local government units must use existing revenue streams to increase their share of revenue. Allegheny County, at the request of county officials, will be permitted to impose a \$2 fee on rental cars, as well as a 10 percent tax on alcoholic beverages (assessed by the glass).
- Provides for an impact study to determine the amount of traffic diverted onto local roadways as a result of the implementation of tolls on I-80.
- Requires the Pennsylvania Turnpike Commission to regularly report to the chairs and minority chairs of the transportation committees in the House and Senate regarding the I-80 tolling project.

The Senate passed the funding bill by a vote of 30-19; it passed the House by a 124-79 margin.
