Shippenburg University and East Stroudsburg University Officials Sign MBA Pact

Shippensburg University and East Stroudsburg University officials signed a letter of agreement that will bring Shippensburg's AACSB Internationally-accredited master of business administration (MBA) program to East Stroudsburg's campus to meet a growing need in that region. Shippensburg President Bill Ruud and by East Stroudsburg President Robert J. Dillman signed the agreement in the Dixon University Center in Harrisburg on June 29, 2011

"One hallmark of the Pennsylvania State System of Higher Education is the ability of its 14-members to work collaboratively to meet the needs of the citizens of the Commonwealth," President Ruud said. "By joining together to offer this program, Shippensburg and East Stroudsburg not only meet the need for this type of programming but continue to make the most effective and efficient use of the resources entrusted to us by the Commonwealth. We look forward to bringing our MBA program to East Stroudsburg and the area it serves."

According to President Dillman, "This partnership with Shippensburg University and its highly respected nationally-accredited MBA program is significant. Offering the program at ESU will provide working professionals, aspiring entrepreneurs, recent ESU graduates and others in the Stroudsburg region with convenient evening access to a high quality, affordable Masters in Business Administration degree program. The partnership also demonstrates the efficiency of cooperative planning between PASSHE universities as we strive to minimize duplication of existing academic programs."

The program, which will begin with the Spring 2012 semester, is through Shippensburg's John L. Grove College of Business. Classes will be taught at East Stroudsburg by Shippensburg faculty and, when needed, by East Stroudsburg faculty. Students must meet admissions requirements set by Shippensburg and will receive their degree from Shippensburg. Students will also be able to use the East Stroudsburg library during their studies. Each university will also appoint a liaison to coordinate the program.

Pocono Raceway's first NASCAR Sprint Cup Series race was in 1974, a second Sprint Cup Series race was added to the Pocono schedule in 1982. Sunday's Good Sam RV Insurance 500 was the 68th Sprint Cup Series at Pocono Raceway. Each race was scheduled for 500 miles and each produced its share of drama and excitement.

Starting with the June 10, 2012 Pocono Sprint Cup Series race, the scheduled distance for both NASCAR Sprint Cup Series races will be shortened to 400 miles. "The 400 mile distance will make NASCAR racing at Pocono even more exciting," stated Raceway President and CEO, Brandon Igdalsky. "Race strategies will change, fuel mileage calculations will be altered and I firmly believe that our fans will be treated to outstanding racing at the 400 mile distance."

"NASCAR supports Pocono Raceway's move to two 400-mile NASCAR Sprint Cup Series races in 2012," stated Steve O'Donnell, NASCAR Senior Vice President, Racing Operations. "We believe this will be a good transition for the fans and competitors. It will provide the teams with a new type of strategy and should make for even more exciting competition at a unique facility that has a long-standing history in our sport."

Eight weeks after the Pocono 400. It will be the August 5, Pennsylvania 400. Both 400 mile races will have the ARCA Racing Series presented by Menards as companion races. The August Pennsylvania 400 weekend will also feature a NASCAR Camping World Truck Series race on August 4.

Completion of the state-of-the-art Dale and Frances Hughes Cancer Center at **Pocono Medical Center** are one step closer after the **Pocono Mountains Economic Development Corporation (PMEDC)** presented Pocono Health System with a check for \$2 million to support the project.

The funds were initially allocated in 2010 via the Local Share Account (LSA) of gaming monies generated by the Mount Airy Casino Resort. The Monroe County Industrial Development Authority (MCIDA), a sister organization of PMEDC, administers local share account projects in Monroe County.

Kathleen E. Kuck, President and CEO of Pocono Health System/Pocono Medical Center explains, "We are very grateful to have received \$2 million from the Local Share Account for the construction of the new Dale and Frances Hughes Cancer Center, a project vitally important to the health care of our community." "The new center allows us to have the most advanced technology and protocols available all under one roof and close to home for treating the leading cause of death in Monroe County," she continues.

"I would like to take this time to thank and acknowledge all of our local, state, and federal officials, the Pocono Mountain Economic Development Corporation, and all of our generous supporters, for their kind support of this project and remind them how the lives of tomorrow's cancer patients and their families will be significantly impacted in a positive way because of their support in making the new Dale and Frances Hughes Cancer Center a reality."

Citing the cancer center as an example, PMEDC Executive Director Chuck Leonard points out that some important regional projects that benefit from LSA funding may not be obvious to the public.

"The public benefits from LSA in many unseen ways," he says. "Whether it's the recent airport expansion, new equipment at the Pocono Family YMCA or the Dale and Frances Hughes Cancer Center, there are dozens of projects in this community that may not have come to fruition as quickly if not for that funding," he continues.

"We owe thanks to the Monroe County Commissioners and our local legislators for supporting projects like these that will generate a return for the community."

The Local Share Assessment Account was established by the Pennsylvania Horse Race and Gaming Development Act, as amended, requires the Commonwealth Financing Authority to distribute money that is generated by licensed gaming facilities to support community and economic development projects.

It should be emphasized that the Local Share Account funds is from a completely separate pool of money than that which is used to reduce property taxes across the Commonwealth. This money rewards host communities who worked to attract gaming licenses with funds for projects that provide benefit to the community.

Giving to **United Way of Monroe County** will now be easier and quicker than ever before, thanks to the launch of a new mobile giving initiative.

At a press conference at the United Way office this morning, 2011 Campaign Co-Chair George Roberts demonstrated how donors can instantly give \$10 by texting or scanning a QR code from their smart phone. United Way has partnered with mGive, part of Denver-based Mobile Accord, to make this possible.

The "text to give" program will be kicked off this weekend at Pocono Raceway in Long Pond, where the United Way of Monroe County will have a table before the races begin. By texting CARS to 50555 or scanning the QR code, donors will be able to contribute to the local United Way and its campaign for helping those in need.

"Our United Way is embracing the latest technology and innovative ways to reach and engage more donors and volunteers," said Roberts. "Donations can be made on-the-spot and there is more top-of-mind awareness. While contributors will still be able to give to our campaign through donations at their workplace, we are trying to connect with brand new donors, including students and visitors to the Poconos."

Co-Chair Connie Roberts gave thanks to GMDC Auto Sales in Blakeslee and Tannersville, and Hilltop Drive-in in Brodheadsville for sponsoring the United Way of Monroe County's text to give platform. "We couldn't have done this without their support," she said. Because of the sponsorship, there is virtually no cost to the nonprofit.

The process is easy and seamless, noted Roberts. Donations are charged to users' cell phone bills, collected from cell phone carriers, and distributed to the nonprofit organization. Plus, donations are identified as tax-deductible. Donors can give to United Way via text up to three times, explained Jen Cullin, who helped with the demonstration and is the interactive media, volunteer and TeenWorks coordinator for United Way of Monroe County.

Besides text messaging, the United Way is inviting cell phone users to sign-up for mobile updates. These updates or alerts can provide information on ways to give back to the community, how donations are improving lives, or getting involved with special events. Exclusive discounts will be offered from time to time to mobile network members.

While Pocono Raceway attendees will have the first chance to try the new giving technology, attendees at other upcoming events like township community days will have the opportunity to give by texting a different short code, "MONROE". People attending StroudFest, the United Way's official campaign kickoff on Sept. 3, will also have this opportunity. And a fall event at ESU will strive to engage more students.

What will a \$10 donation provide? It can cover two meals to a homebound elderly person, give a child a hearing or vision screening, provide an emergency food/gas card, or enable a visually impaired individual to attend a support group meeting.

United Way of Monroe County is following the trend of United Ways across the country, especially those in large metropolitan areas that are using text messaging for fundraising and cutting-edge constituent interaction. Mobile Accord and its mGive provider are the preferred partner of United Way Worldwide and about 50 United Ways nationwide. In the United States, there are 240 million mobile subscribers and 30 billion text messages are sent per month, according to Mobile Accord.

"Our board is supporting this new mobile platform because it will benefit our partner agencies and their programs, and our direct services," said Curtis Rogers, board President of the United Way of Monroe County. "It all comes down to helping those in need, from preschoolers and single parent households to the disabled and elderly. We will be generating more funds and more awareness," he added.

George Roberts, who formerly chaired the local United Way's marketing committee, noted how all community outreach, online marketing and general promotional efforts will integrate the mobile technology. Earlier this year, the United Way of Monroe County launched Facebook and Twitter pages. Its website has continually been upgraded and improved as well. George and Connie Roberts said the mGive initiative has been in the works for a couple of months.

The United Way of Monroe County provides health and human services through community initiatives and funding to more than 30 local programs. Its targeted need areas include Engaging Youth, Meeting Basic Needs, Helping Children Succeed and Promoting Self-Sufficiency. NCC Offers Lead-Safe Certification Training. As of April 2010, the Environmental Protection Agency requires that painters, plumbers, carpenters, electricians and window disturbing paint in housing and child-occupied facilities built before 1978 become lead-safe certified, or risk costly fines. On September 6, Northampton Community College will offer an eight-hour class, "Lead Safety for Renovation, Repair & Painting," at the Fowler Family Southside Center in Bethlehem.

Developed by the EPA in collaboration with the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), the class is for those who want to obtain EPA certification as a

Certified Renovator, which will enhance their credentials as private contractors and satisfy HUD requirements for interim controls training in Federally-assisted target housing.

The September 6 session will be held from 8:00 am to 5:00 p.m. in room 627. It includes a certification exam, which will be administered at the end of the class. The course code is CSTT1003-Q3. The class will also be held November 15 from 8:00 to 5:00 p.m. in room 527. The course code for the November session is CSTT1003-Q4.
