





On Mentors and Mentoring: Building Strong Men-TORS

came across a quotation in a recent reading that spoke to my spirit.

Said the anonymous author: "besides their fathers, every young male needs other men as mentors speaking regularly into his life. The relationship is better if it is over the course of years as they are walking side by side."

Our Holy Writ, both old and new divisions detail accounts of the mantel of wisdom and subsequent leadership being transferred from a senior seasoned man walking beside a younger male mentee, tender in years and green in life's experiences.

Abraham imparted wisdom, correction, and direction to his brother's son, Lot. Rascal though he was, Jacob was sent to a far country to mature under the direction of an uncle more sinister in motive than Jacob himself was.

Elijah disrobed his mantel and placed it on the shoulders of Elisha so that his protégé could prophesy to and lead God's people.

Moses, though found in a floating basket for his protection was "mentored" in the household of Pharaoh and came of age while mastering the state-of-the-art learnings in mathematics, philosophy, history, hieroglyphics, and leadership.

Jesus of Nazareth gave guidance and broadened the worldviews of those who were his disciples, particularly young John, while Paul, as he knew the mother and grandmother of young Timothy, gave vocational guidance to his loyalist.

TO WALK BESIDE AND GUIDE THE THOUGHT PROCESSES and shape the thinking and resulting actions of a young manchild is often the duty and responsibility of the father, but all Black men have an abiding duty to ensure that those who walk behind us learn to walk boldly, confidently, and shamelessly before the world.

If your father, teacher, pastor, coach, or mentor believes you can do something, accomplish some goal, achieve some victory, you are more likely to do it.

Forty years ago, the author Robert Bly penned a book entitled **Iron John** wherein he shared a line that went, *A boy becomes a man when an older man sees him.*

With influence from one who sees the boy, the trajectory of the life of the boy can be redirected, while the course of your life can be altered. To see those young Black princes who walk behind us is the opportunity that male mentoring affords us.

While it may be cliché to hear one say, be the mentor you wish you had, it cannot be overstated that the commitment to truly great mentorship places a huge and disproportionate investment of time with the desired resulting outcome does not yield blessings and benefits for years to come. But the investment of time must be made anyway so that the world in which we live and the culture in which those who come after us will reside is made better. The gift of your time in mentoring is an investment that will keep on giving generations beyond you.

There is an ancient Mandarin proverb that says: the best time to plant a tree was 20 years ago. The second-best time is now.

MEN OF OMEGA CANNOT BE HELD RESPONSIBLE for that which has not been done in the lives of young Black boys in yesteryear, but we can take ownership of shaping the strong Black men of tomorrow, one life at a time.

MEN OF OMEGA MUST BE DETERMINED, must be disciplined, must be focused, and cannot be afraid to unleash the latent potential that lies beneath the outward energy displayed by our sons in need of direction. Where they go and how fast they get there is largely determined by our willingness to invest ourselves in them and invest we must.

Mandela said it far better than I ever could: **History will** judge us by the difference we make in the everyday lives of our children.

Using Our Dollars to Invest in Our Future

Brothers, Sisters, Supporters, et. al.,

am currently the President of ALEF, a missiondriven 501(c)3 organization dedicated to supporting our home chapter--Lambda Epsilon, alma mater -Tuskegee University, and its local community. I write this note to you with clarity, urgency, and conviction: it's time we build a sustainable culture of investing in our HBCUs—financially and beyond.

IN TODAY'S ECONOMIC CLIMATE—with inflation, job instability, and rising cost of living-it's understandable why charitable giving often takes a backseat. But now more than ever, we must double down on supporting our HBCUs. These institutions are the bedrock of Black excellence and generational uplift, yet they remain underfunded and too often overlooked.

This movement isn't just about philanthropy—it's about changing our habits and our mindset. For generations, we've been conditioned not to talk about money. Financial literacy has been absent from too many of our homes, schools, churches, and circles of influence. As a result, we've relied on fragmented information, predatory advice, and fractured hope. That cycle ends now.

OUR HBCUs HAVE STOOD STRONG despite historic underfunding, minimal state support, and systemic neglect. We must act—not just as alumni, but as a people with deliberate and recurring investments that secure the future of these institutions.

Let's commit to more than degree opportunities—we must build for generational impact. Learn and teach others about financial health. Advocate for family/generational wealth-building. Start monthly sustained giving campaigns— \$25, \$50, \$100 adds up fast. Properly invest in insurance, real estate, mutual funds, and succession planning. Give intentionally. Educate consistently. Recycle our dollars within our community multiple times before they exit. If other cultures can do it 10 times, we must aim higher.

BLACK GREEK LETTER ORGANIZATIONS, (the Divine 9), have a vital role to play. We must consider adding HBCU support to our mandated programs. We must also increase our scholarship opportunities. Consider supporting minor infrastructure projects. Promote and build endowment accounts. Give at the chapter, regional, and national levels. If not us — who?

As a proud graduate of Tuskegee University, I know firsthand the power of an HBCU education. I've walked the yard, benefited from grants and scholarships, taken on loans, and now work within our foundation to give back—funding campus infrastructure, awarding scholarships, and growing

our endowment.

Is it bold? Yes! Is it ambitious? You bet! Is it necessary? Absolutely!

OUR FUTURE DEPENDS ON US. Would we truly risk living in a world where our HBCUs no longer exist? Not on our watch! The culture, history, and brilliance lost would be immeasurable.

So I ask: Will you join the movement? Will you commit to a monthly gift (big or small)? Will you mentor, advocate, and invest in the very institutions that have offered access to higher education for multiple generations?

Black Males Face a Mental Depression Crisis

rothers, as we continue our work in Fatherhood and Mentoring and engaging in Brother, You're On My Mind efforts, it is becoming increasingly important to understand the impact that we can have on addressing the issue of depression in Black males. This proactive, preventative effort in reaching out to others goes a long way in helping to identify those individuals who are stressed and facing situations that leads to depression.

Black males across the United States face significant mental depression challenges, influenced by lack of employment, health issues, educational disparities, systemic racism, and social injustices. Add to this list the impact of life challenges that youth face, especially males because of the impact of fathers not being present in the home. These are all obstacles contributing to a growing mental depression crisis within the Black community leading to fatal results.

According to the American Psychological Association, suicide rates among Black males have risen in recent years. A 2024 research letter published in JAMA Psychiatry revealed a startling shift: in 2013, the midlife mortality rate from so-called "deaths of despair"— via suicide, alcohol use, and drug overdoses—was nearly twice as high among White males as Black males. By 2022, however, the death rate among Black individuals had nearly tripled, reaching 103.81 per 100,000, compared to 102.63 per 100,000 among Whites. These challenges are a major concern and must be addressed.

Our efforts in working with fathers, young men and boys goes a long way in getting ahead of the game in discussing and dealing with potential life issues before they become serious problems. The engaging in training sessions and activities that teach Bro. Robert W. Fairchild individuals how to cope with everyday situations builds.



confidence. We do this well in Fatherhood and Mentoring.

Brothers, I ask that we take the next step. Engage in Brother, You're On My Mind efforts; we can identify and reach out to individuals that may need help. We can make a difference in many cases helping to prevent depression leading to fatal results and by helping to turn this trend around. Your reaching out to individuals shows them that you care and are concerned. It could make the difference between a life-or-death decision by the troubled person.

Vocabulary Update: An Old Word for New Ears!

Drapetomania: A term coined in the 19th century by Dr. Samuel A. Cartwright, a physician who supported slavery, to describe a supposed mental illness that caused enslaved people to run away. Cartwright believed that enslaved people who ran away were suffering from an irrational and uncontrollable desire to escape, which he called drapetomania. He claimed that this illness was caused by the "peculiar habits" of the African race and that it could be cured by harsh punishments, such as whippings and amputations.

Its Scientific Validity: Drapetomania is widely considered to be a pseudoscientific concept, as there is no scientific evidence to support its existence. It was used as a tool to justify slavery and suppress the resistance of enslaved people.

Legacy: The term "drapetomania" is now seen as a racist and offensive relic of the slavery era. It is important to remember that this term was used to dehumanize and oppress enslaved people, and it has no place in modern medical discourse.

Just A Thought: A Clear and Present Danger

N today's environment, amongst the myriads of executive orders, administrative policies, restrictive measures, legislative decisions placed in our path, there is a message that is crystal clear in its tone and tenor; i.e., a growing sentiment among some to put Black folks "back in their place" by resurrecting Jim Crow era verbiage and efforts as a grim reminder. Just like the measles, overt racism is back in full effect.

To put my opening statement into perspective, the Senegalese scholar Dr. Cheikh Anta Diop says: for an oppressor to oppress a people they must take away 3 things: their history, their language, and their psychological factors. Further research reveals that Dr. Leonard Jeffries describes psychological factors mentioned by Dr. Diop as being the values, interests, and principles of a people. Once those are taken away, the oppressor substitutes their own values, interests and principles via constant messaging and reinforcement.

The result of that substitution is that the oppressed, when faced with challenges, will most likely arrive at a conclusion that will be to the benefit of the oppressor. That psychological paradigm answers a question many of us have when wondering why so many choices our people make don't always serve our best interest; they tend to make us complicit in perpetuating our own oppression.

THE GRAVITATIONAL PULL **OF RACISM**

The "Pull of Racism" is real and is posing a clear and present danger that could effectively impose negative consequences on Black people up and down the spectrum - regardless of economic status or reputation. Consequences that could set all people of color back 75 years, by restricting their ability to maintain their station, or prevent the accumulation or transfer of wealth and position for several generations to come.

The oppressors begin their attacks by utilizing the age-old tactic of misinformation. Alternative facts are repeated over and over, logic is dismissed, the truth is concealed or distorted, and the oppressors portray themselves as the actual victims.

Another adage says: the bigger the lie - the longer it's told - the more people will believe it.

THE FALSE NARRATIVES

False narratives are repeated today incessantly, not only in collective speech by officials, surrogates, and social media personalities, but also spewed via various outlets such as social media, television, and print. The oppressors create confusion by giving words and deeds new meanings which are negative, contradictory, and often incendiary.

For example, the privileged class, (be it privilege by wealth, station, position, generational or just the "Good Ole Boy" system), has traditionally benefitted from laws and opportunities to which the underprivileged did not have access.

With the passing of the Civil Rights Bill of 1964 and other legislation that leveled the playing field, the nonprivileged gained access to opportunities, primarily employment, education, judicial, and healthcare, that had been denied them for generations. And most recently, the privileged class has successfully argued that being fair to those who are defined as underprivileged is unfair to those that are privileged. It appears, ironically, that fairness is now considered a discriminatory practice and cannot be used against the privileged class.

Another, and more stark example rests with the purpose of Diversity,

Equity, and Inclusion, commonly referred to by the acronym DEI. Recognizing and allowing others to share different ideas, experiences, talents, and abilities would seem to be a benefit, unfortunately without a shred of proof, those that position themselves as oppressors have hijacked that concept and have equated DEI with substandard performance.

Moving forward with that premise that any female, person of color, or especially a Black employee is subject to be labeled a DEI hire and removed from their job or position based solely on the color of their skin, without any consideration given to their qualifications, job performance or merit. You may call that practice what you want, but to me it has the textbook definition of racism.

Definitions of Racism

To clarify and punctuate my point, I searched for definitions of racism that did not just explain what it was but described how it is. Here are definitions that seemed to corroborate my thought process. "Historically, those who openly professed or practiced racism held that members of low-status races should be limited to low-status jobs and that

members of the dominant race should have exclusive access to political power, economic resources, high-status jobs, and unrestricted Civil Rights" (https:// www.britannica.com/topic/racism).

Second, by the late 19th & Early 20th Century, the above ideology had evolved with the help of many 'so-called' academics, medical professionals, scientists, theologians and polygenists who crafted those thoughts into what became a more palatable and justifiable practice called Social Darwinism which espoused that "the poor were the unfit and should not be aided in the struggle existence" (https:// www.britannica.com/topic/social-Darwinism), and that wealth was a sign of success.

SOCIAL DARWINISM

At the societal level, social Darwinism was used as a philosophical rationalization for imperialist, colonialist, and racist policies, sustaining belief in Anglo Saxon

or Aryan cultural and biological superiority.

By being aware or "Woke" to the strategies used against us and knowing what to expect from the oppressors, we can break those psychological bonds and successfully navigate the cultural, social, and economic obstacle course in our path. By educating ourselves, along with our students, our families, and our people, and by studying understanding our history, our language, our values, our interests and our principles, the threat οf the misinformation campaign can be assuaged and over time even negated.

THROUGHOUT MY COLUMNS I have stressed the importance of knowing our history by referencing historical instances and the results of previous misinformation campaigns, exposing distorted versions of history, and stressing the importance of knowing what history is being fed to our children, grandchildren, and students. Inaccurate interpretation and narratives often downplay and eliminates our ancestors' contributions and their resiliency, all to

eliminate our hope for the future and leave us vulnerable and complicit.

In response to the "clear and present danger" of the misinformation strategy detailed above, additional assets and resources are being discussed to enhance the Fatherhood Initiative Newsletter and will be presented to the editor when fully designed.

The enhancements will include true and accurate history lessons, along with entrepreneurial, personal development, effective communication, decisionmaking and other modules that can be delivered via a dedicated Fatherhood Initiative YouTube channel and other social media platforms to Educate, Empower, and Enrich our future leaders with the truth.


This video enhancement is being developed with the objective of evolving into a certified course to include learning objectives and school credits.

The Leadership Impact of the Exodus Midwives: **Lessons for Today's Men**

he story of Shiphrah and Puah, the Hebrew midwives in Exodus 1, stands as one of the earliest and most powerful examples of moral leadership in the face of tyranny.

When Pharaoh, the most powerful ruler of the ancient world, commanded them to kill every newborn Hebrew boy, these women quietly but resolutely refused, choosing to honor God rather than obey an immoral order.

Their leadership impact is profound for several reasons. First, their decision to resist was not dramatic or selfpromoting. The text simply says, "The midwives, however, feared God and did not do what the King of Egypt had told them to do; they let the boys live" (Exodus 1:17). Their courage was rooted in a deep moral conviction—a fear of God that outweighed fear of earthly power. This is the first recorded act of civil disobedience in history, and it changed the course of a nation.

The midwives' names are preserved in Scripture, while Pharaoh's is forgotten. This contrast highlights a timeless truth: those who stand for righteousness, even in obscurity, leave a legacy that outlasts the powerful who serve only themselves. Because of their faithfulness, God honored them, giving them families and a place in the unfolding story of Israel's redemption.

Principles for Leading in Difficult Times

The example of Shiphrah and Puah offers enduring leadership lessons, especially relevant for men navigating today's challenges:

• Prioritize Moral Conviction Over Popularity

True leaders make the right decision, not the easy or popular one. The midwives risked everything to do what was right, teaching us that integrity is the foundation of lasting influence.

Lead by Example, Not by Command

They did not ask others to take risks they were unwilling to take themselves. Modern leaders must be willing to "get their hands dirty" and model the courage and compassion they expect from others.

• Resilience in the Face of Pressure

Leadership during crisis requires grit and resilience. The midwives acted under threat of death, showing that Brother Charles "Chuck" Clemons steadfastness in adversity often defines great leadership.



• Compassion and Kindness

Their refusal to participate in genocide was an act of profound compassion. In a world often marked by division and cruelty, leading with kindness and empathy is more vital than ever.

Obedience to a Higher Calling

The midwives' loyalty was first to God and to life. Today's leaders must remember that there are values and principles higher than any earthly authority or policy.

Conclusion

The story of the Exodus midwives is not just a tale of ancient heroism; it is a blueprint for leadership in dark times. Shiphrah and Puah remind us that true leaders may be unsung, their actions quiet but world-changing. For men today, their example calls for courage, integrity, compassion, and unwavering commitment to what is right—even when it is costly. In honoring God and protecting life, they shaped history. So can we.



Each cohort is tailored to meet specific developmental and academic needs of their age groups:

- Elementary & Middle School Cohorts: Emphasize academic achievement and behavioral development.
- High School Cohort: Maintains academic focus while also preparing mentees for adulthood, college, and leadership roles.

MENTORING PROVIDED BY 23 DEDICATED VOLUNTEERS, all of whom undergo annual background checks and commit to regular bi-Saturday sessions, and weekly check-ins with their mentees.

Valued Partnerships:

OAMP thrives through strong community partnerships and collaborative relationships:

HCPSS: Provides facilities and a liaison, Ms. Tanya Holland, (education professional) volunteers her time to



coordinate program activities with the school system, monitor the mentees grades, and interfaces with the mentees' families.

The Bridge Builders Foundation of Maryland: Serves as OAMP's funding partner, conducting annual fundraising events that sustain this vital initiative.

A Summary of 2024–2025 Program Highlights OAMP's impact was reflected in a host of activities:

- High School Seniors and Juniors Toured nine HBCUs
- Chess instruction and competitions
- Dress and Decorum etiquette training
- Money Management Fundamentals
- African American History
- HBCU Football Game Morgan State vs Norfolk State
- Comprehensive STEM Project
- Curriculum integrated reading, analytical, writing, math, speaking, and presentation skills complete their STEM projects
- Movie Day featuring "The Forge" with guided discussions
- Christmas and New Year Holiday Celebration
- The Great Debate. Debate team training. Focuses on research, deliberation, team work, and public speaking. The event culminated in debate team competition.
- Career Day. Professional black men sharing career p a t h s, educational requirements, and guidance.

Our Kids Read (OKR) is a national book distribution center., in the State of Maryland, whose mission is to promote family literacy.

The Cities included Teaneck, Paterson, Jersey City, Newark, East Orange, Elizabeth, New Brunswick, Trenton, Asbury Park, and Sicklerville.

The June 13, 2025 program concluded at a Pre Father's Day Resource Fair hosted by the East Orange Family Success Center. Fathers were encouraged to attend the Summer Kick Off Resource fair to receive additional books and to register children for a variety of summer camps including sports, theater, and literacy.

Two hundred fathers attended the resource fair and the City of East Orange provided a City Proclamation thanking the Our Kids Read Company and the Eta Pi Chapter for continued support of children and families around literacy promotion. Brother Barry Devone, Chairman for the Greater Essex County Uplift Foundation, said, "today is special to see so many fathers truly engaged in the lives of their children. The Eta Pi Chapter, working in collaboration with GECUF and the East Orange Family Success Center, plans to expand this program in the years to come."

Stevens reported the success of the collaboration at the District's Fall Meeting and stated "in 2025 the State of NJ secured one thousand books with plans to expand to seven thousand in 2026 for the Second District and possibly twentyfive thousand across the Fraternity in 2027 and beyond."

Wild and Wonderful: A Father's Tribute to Jared J. **Thomas**

By James "JT" Thomas Jr

became a husband while still a young man, already blessed with a son from a previous relationship. That first son, James Thomas III, is my spitting image. He inherited my mannerisms, my name, and my alma mater. We are both James "JT" Thomas. I'm the Jr., and he is the III. Together, we've walked similar paths: both of us were student-athletes at West Virginia University, both of us proud brothers of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity Inc., through the Nu Zeta Chapter, he crossed as "Two Tymez" in 2008, and I as "Timebomb" in Spring 1995.

We even made history as the first father-son duo to cross through Nu Zeta. My son went on to play seven years in the NFL, drafted by the Chicago Bears in 2011, later playing for the Jaguars, and retiring with the New York Giants.

While I'm proud of his success, this story isn't about my professional athlete son. This story is about my second son: Jared J. Thomas. And what a journey it's been.

Jared was born just two hours after my birthday, on October 22, 2003, a gift I'll never forget. From the start, Jared showed signs that he was extraordinary. As a toddler, he amazed us by solving puzzles and meticulously lining up his toys. He seemed like a little genius. But when Jared was around three years old, his daycare teacher suggested we have him evaluated for autism.

At the time, my wife and I were unfamiliar with the term. We were a young Black couple raising a family in Wild and Wonderful West Virginia, far from our extended families, facing the unknown.

JARED WAS DIAGNOSED WITH AUTISM, and his early years were filled with unique challenges. He was nonverbal for a significant part of his childhood and wasn't potty-trained until age six. I won't sugarcoat it, it was a stressful and sometimes overwhelming time, especially for my wife. But we were never alone. We were fortunate to have an incredible network of educators, therapists, and a community that wrapped its arms around us. They helped us navigate the world of IEPs, interventions, and early support services.

And Jared? Jared rose to the occasion. He persevered through high school, never letting labels define him. Eventually, he was accepted into the Country Roads Program at West Virginia University, a post-secondary initiative that gives individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities a college experience.

Jared lived in the dorms, learned life skills, made friends, and grew in ways we couldn't have imagined years earlier. Watching him walk across campus, knowing the hurdles he overcame just to get there, filled my heart in ways that touchdowns and trophies never could.

Jared recently completed the program and is now preparing for the next chapter in life. One thing that really touched me was the bond he developed

with the brothers of Omega Psi Phi. He loves the Ques, and they've shown him love right back, helping him move in, mentoring him, and treating him like family. That's what Brotherhood looks like. That's what community feels like.

And so, to my Brothers, especially those raising children with special needs, I want you to hear this:

I know your journey. I've walked it. And I want to remind you that you're not alone.

This road will test your patience, your spirit, and your faith. But it will also reveal the deepest kind of love. You'll learn to celebrate small wins that mean more than most people will ever understand. You'll become your child's biggest advocate, protector, and believer.

You were chosen for this. Your child is not a burden, they're a blessing with a different rhythm, a different light, and a different path. And when they succeed in their own way, it will move you like nothing else ever has.

Lean on your village. Lean on this Brotherhood. Let your story be a testimony that uplifts another family. And never forget, your love, your presence, and your perseverance matter.

Jared may not have played under stadium lights or worn a college jersey, but he's the bravest soul I know.

He is, without a doubt, wild and wonderful, just like our home state.

And I'm proud to be his father!

The experience not only showed the brothers' adaptability and dedication but also provided valuable insights into the students' academic strengths and growth areas.

These observations will help shape future BKK mentoring efforts, particularly in early-grade academic support.

In recognition of the students' hard work throughout the year, the BKK Fatherhood and Mentoring Program went a step further by purchasing gift bags filled with treats and toys, which were distributed during the final week of school. This gesture added a celebratory close to the academic year and helped foster a spirit of encouragement and joy among students.

Through service and recognition, BKK brothers are actively building stronger connections with Triangle Lake Montessori and the wider community, embodying their mission to uplift and empower youth through education and engagement.



South Carolina Celebrating Growth and Purpose:

Epsilon Nu's Bridge Builders Awards Program

he Epsilon Nu Chapter's Bridge Builders Mentoring Program concluded the 2024–2025 school year with its much-anticipated Annual Awards Program, bringing together proud parents, grandparents, and community members to recognize the remarkable progress of participating students.

The highlight of the event was a stirring keynote address by the chapter's very own Brother Dr. Brian Chad Starks—an accomplished speaker, author, social justice advocate, and CEO of BCS & Associates Consulting Firm. Drawing on themes from his book Courageous Hearts, Brother Starks delivered a powerful message about the importance of living out the four cardinal principles and using them as tools to advocate social justice and personal excellence.

Although the book was originally written for adults, the insights gained from engaging directly with the Bridge Builder mentees inspired Brother Starks to consider creating a youth-focused version. By the close of the event, he was already formulating ideas to bring that vision to life.

Beyond the inspiring words and heartfelt recognition, the program celebrated something even more tangible, significant, measurable growth. Empirical data presented at the ceremony showed marked improvement in both academic performance and behavior among the mentees throughout the year. These outcomes are a testament not only to the dedication of the students, but to the unwavering



support and mentorship provided by the Brothers of Epsilon Nu.

With hearts full of pride and eyes on the future, the chapter looks forward to continuing its impactful work and building on this legacy of uplift and empowerment.

The Port Royal [South Carolina] Experiment

When [Harriett] Tubman arrived in Beaufort [South Carolina], the influence of the Port Royal Experiment could be felt, though its main areas of operation were not in the city, where Tubman was headquartered, but in the rural areas. Still, she and those in the experiment would overlap considerably in the coming months.

Free labor was the essence of the Port Royal Experiment. In late November 1861, weeks after the Battle of Port Royal, Adjutant General Lorenza Thomas seized the Sea Island cotton crop and the remainder of the Confederate planters' property for the benefit of the federal government. Some of the proceeds went into a "cotton fund" set aside for the Port Royal Experiment's expenses. William H. Reynolds, a rear admiral in the US Navy, was appointed supervisor of the cotton agents on the Sea Islands. These cotton agents, who were largely military men, were charged by the federal government with administering Black laborers' production of Sea Island cotton and selling it in New York. Most were decidedly abolitionist and did not stick around after the crop was harvested. Sea Island Blacks working on the cotton plantations were employed as wage laborers for the federal government. Employing former slaves to pick and gin the valuable Sea Island cotton crop abandoned by fleeing plantation owners and sell the cotton had been the US government's first order of business after the "Great Skedaddle." (Edward L. Pierce, The Negro at Port Royal: Report of the E.L, Pierce, Government Agent, to the Hon. Salmon P. Chase, Secretary of the Treasury [Boston R. F. Wallcut, 1862], et.al.)



Empowering the Future: the Saturday Academy at Tindley Accelerated School By Bro Daniel Pierson

ndianapolis, IN - Mentorship has long been a cornerstone of personal and academic success, and its value was on full display at the Saturday Academy at Tindley Accelerated School, an initiative led by the Indiana Council on Educating Students of Color (The Council) and the member organizations of the Divine 9 Indianapolis. Chaired by Daniel Pierson of the Zeta Phi Chapter of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity Inc., this pilot program provided tutoring and mentoring services to 28 high school seniors, setting the stage for a stronger academic foundation and brighter career futures.

A Program Rooted in Purpose; The primary goal of the Saturday Academy was to support and guide students as they navigated critical milestones in their education. Through dedicated mentorship, students received personalized assistance in refining their Capstone Projects, exploring majors suited to their interests and strengths, and charting meaningful career paths. Beyond individual guidance, this program also signaled the beginning of a larger movement—an effort to organize a coalition of Divine 9 members committed to improving student achievement through mentorship and advocacy.

Key Observations and Success Stories: The Saturday Academy provided three impactful mentoring

sessions on April 12th, 19th, and 26th, during which students and mentors worked collaboratively to make significant strides:

- Many Capstone Projects neared completion, showcasing strong writing, thorough analysis, and clear academic rigor.
- Students sought presentation coaching to boost confidence in their Capstone Defense, refining their delivery and public speaking skills.
- Several students had already secured college acceptances and defined career goals, while others benefited from additional guidance in shaping their future.
- Some participants required follow-up mentoring sessions to finalize their projects, ensuring they were fully prepared for their next steps.

Lasting Impact of Mentorship: The success of this pilot program reinforces the undeniable power of mentorship, the ability to bridge gaps, open doors, and elevate aspirations. When students have access to trusted advisors, they gain the confidence and knowledge needed to pursue higher education, navigate professional paths, and grow into future leaders.

More than a curriculum, the program offers hope, healing, and practical tools for a successful transition into adulthood. Backed by community partners, Bro. Jules fills critical gaps left by absent father figures, proving that mentorship, when sustained and sincere, changes lives.

Fatherhood Program of the Year: 2024 Fatherhood Conference Tau Tau Chapter was once again recognized, this time for organizing the 2024 Fatherhood Conference, named Fatherhood Program of the Year. Held at California State University, Dominguez Hills in August 2024, this milestone event marked the conference's first time operating independently, drawing in fathers from across Los Angeles, Riverside, and San Bernardino counties.

Attendees engaged in dynamic workshops and seminars focused on parenting, emotional wellness, legal literacy, and personal development. In collaboration with Tau Tau, Uplift LA has hosted vital mental health programs and outreach efforts that go beyond temporary fixes. Their holistic model nurtures long-term growth, making an indelible impact on countless families in the Los Angeles area.

12th District International Fatherhood/Mentoring Chapter of the Year:

A separate but equally esteemed recognition, the 12th District International Chapter of the Year award went to Phi Beta Beta Chapter.

A standout effort was the chapter's participation in a March 2024 Long Beach Unified School District event, which emphasized the crucial role of Black fathers in education.

Spearheaded in part by Bro. Lyonell Henson, the event sparked meaningful dialogue, community connection, and advocacy—setting a gold standard for grassroots fatherhood engagement. In recognition, the chapter was presented with a \$5,000 award by Brother Ricky L. Lewis, 42nd Grand Basileus, during the 12th District Meeting.

He's Doing The Difficult, With Love and Respect

Do the difficult." In the only known recording of his voice, that was the charge of our Founder, Bishop Edgar Amos Love. He asked the Lord, "Give me this mountain," not because it was easy,

but because it was necessary. That same mindset applies to fatherhood, scholarship, and to every Brother striving to lead his family and live up to the high standards of Omega.

In 2023, I flew to the Bahamas to represent the 12th District at the Dr. Moses C. Norman, Sr., International Leadership Conference as Scholar of the Year. The moment I checked into my

hotel room, I received the call. My father had passed away.

Just weeks before, my wife and I had shared the news that we were expecting twin boys. A few weeks after laying my

father to rest, I started graduate school at San Diego State University in the Master of Social Work Clinical Practice program. One month in, my sons were born.

There was no time to slow down. Life was full, and I was being stretched in every direction. With every course in person and my wife back to work, I had to figure out how to get to class. Many days, I brought my

sons with me. While others sat in quiet classrooms, I was rocking car seats while taking notes.

This was not easy. There were moments I questioned whether I could keep going. But I stayed grounded. I leaned into the Word through monthly district Bible studies. I leaned on the strength of the Bruhz who poured into me when I needed it most.



While in school, I continued working as a licensed barber. My barber chair became more than a seat for a haircut. It became a space for Black men to talk about mental health, parenting, and manhood. I used my chair to spark honest

> conversations about being present fathers, loving husbands, and responsible men. I hope to continue using my care as a tool to help men grow, heal, and lead.

> I used to search for signs of my father after he passed. Now, I see him in how I show up for my sons. His birthday is June 16, and most years it falls on Father's Day. To

honor his life and legacy, I created a nonprofit called Love Always, Dad, named after how he signed every card he gave me. This work is rooted in presence, accountability, and love.

> On May 18, 2025, I walked the graduation stage with my master's degree. Just days before, I had been named 12th District Scholar of the Year for the fourth time. My sons were there to witness it. That moment was not just about achievement. It was about legacy. It was about showing my children, and the men of Omega, what it means to keep going when the

mountain is steep. Fatherhood is not an obstacle to leadership. It is where leadership begins.

To the Bruhz reading this: you can do both. You can raise your children and rise in your calling.

Do the difficult; you were made for this!

ominican Republic – (Col Ret) Dr. Lawrence Henry, a retired Green Beret, with 26 years of military service, founder and executive director of a non-profit called Bridge to Light, addressed the 13th International District at its 32nd Annual Meeting. The meeting was held under the leadership of the 13th International District Representative Bro Freddie Thompson, IV, in Puerto Plata, Dominican Republic from April 3 – April 7, 2025.

Dr. Lawrence Henry engaged the group twice during the conference, during the leadership luncheon and during a focused presentation on the protection of womanhood. During the leadership luncheon, Dr. Lawrence spoke about various forms of violence that affect the communities in which they live and its effects on Omega.

Given the current political, informational, and economic environments that are severely impacting underserved communities, Dr. Henry demanded that members of the 13th District transcend the borders of the individual, chapter, district, and fraternity and become ambassadors of brotherhood and friendship to the world. He challenged the brotherhood to become agents of change by serving as mentors to wayward youth. He amplified this point by stating, "it is easier to mentor someone who has role models that attended Howard, Morgan or Penn State, but how about those youth whose role models were from the State Penn(itentiary)! We must possess the physical and moral courage to mentor these young men as well!", he said.

During Dr. Henry's focused presentation, he asked conference attendees the question, "What is Violence?" Beyond the physical manifestation of violence, Dr. Henry spoke about the maldevelopment, and deprivation aspects of violence directed towards marginalized groups – in this case,

Black and Brown women.

He highlighted the physical and psychological aspects of *Intimate Partner Violence* and addressed the concept of "Gaslighting." He used several examples to illustrate what gaslighting is as it relates to intimate partner violence. Phrases such as "Stop being so sensitive" and "Why are you so angry" were cited during the presentation.

Dr. Henry concluded with a few suggestions that could create the proper environment to respect and protect womanhood. First, organizations such as Omega Psi Phi should partner with organizations that have a shared mission, goal, and objectives to reduce the effects of or instances of intimate partner violence, physical, direct, and indirect violence directed towards women. Second, host protection of womanhood panel discussions to assist in understanding how women define protection, examine different forms of violence directed at women, and identify obstacles that prevent men from respecting and protecting women and their communities.

Lastly, Dr. Henry spoke about his fight with combat – related to stage 3 colon cancer and his current fight with stage 4 colon cancer. He encouraged the brothers of the 13th District to educate, motivate, and agitate members in communities to receive the proper screenings and gain an education about chronic diseases – namely prostate, colon, and lung cancer.

International, District, and Chapter brothers received Brother Dr. Lawrence Henry's message very well, and he has taken action to operationalize his observations and recommendations.

Brother Sterling A. Brown, was born on the campus of Howard University, May 1, 1901, the last of six children and the only boy born to the Rev. Sterling Nelson, a former slave and prominent professor in the Howard University Divinity School, and Adelaide (Allen) Brown. He graduated as the top student from Dunbar High School, Washington, D.C., in 1918, received a bachelor's degree from Williams College and was elected to Phi Beta Kappa. In 1923, he earned a master's degree from Harvard University and was employed as a teacher at the Virginia Seminary and College in Lynchburg until 1926. He married Daisy Turnbull in 1927. Two years later, he began teaching at Howard University. Brown is known for his frank, unsentimental portraits of Black people and their experiences, as well as the incorporation of African American folklore and contemporary idiom into his verse. He entered Omega Chapter January 13, 1989, in Takoma Park, Maryland.
